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

- 1. A couple of years ago, a book published in 1972 by a now dead British Professor suddenly became a collector's item. *Pure, White and Deadly* by John Yudkin was listed as one of the most coveted out-of-print works in the world. The cause was a lecture called Sugar: the Bitter Truth by Robert Lustig, professor of pediatric endocrinology. Yudkin's work was hailed by Lustig as 'prophetic'.
- Posted on YouTube in 2009, Lustig's 90-minute talk has received 4.1 million hits and is credited with kick-starting the anti-sugar movement, a campaign that calls for sugar to be treated as a toxin, like alcohol and tobacco, and for sugar-laden foods to be taxed, labelled with health warnings and banned for anyone under 18. He believes sugar not only makes you fat and rots your teeth, but also causes several chronic and common illnesses, including heart disease, cancer, Alzheimer's and diabetes. It is also addictive, since it interferes with our appetites and creates an irresistible urge to eat.
- 3. In the 1960s, scientists were scrambling to work out the reasons for an alarming rise in heart disease levels. After a while, a consensus emerged: the culprit was the high level of fat in our diets. Market research showed that 'healthy' products and low-fat foods would prove popular. By the start of the '70s, supermarkets were awash with low-fat yoghurts, spreads and 20 even desserts.
- One voice stood out in opposition. John Yulkin, had been doing his own experiments. Instead of blaming fat, he claimed that there was a clearer correlation between the rise in heart disease and a rise in the consumption of sugar. His book, *Pure, White and Deadly,* questioned whether there was any causal link between fat and heart disease. After all, we had been eating butter for centuries, while sugar, up until the 1850s had been something of a rare treat for most people.
- This was not what the food industry wanted to hear. When devising their low-fat products, manufacturers had needed a fat substitute to stop the food tasting like cardboard, and had chosen sugar. The new 'healthy food' was low-fat, but had sugar by the spoonful. There was a campaign by

the food industry to discredit Yudkin's work. The World Sugar Research Organisation described his book as "science fiction".

- Yudkin was 'uninvited' from international conferences. When he did contribute, papers he gave attacking sugar were omitted from publication.
 He had been so discredited that few scientists dared publish anything negative about sugar.
- 7. Yudkin's detractors had one trump card: his evidence often relied on observations, rather than on explanations. He could tell you that diabetes rates were rising, but not why. The reason: three or four of the hormones that would explain his theories had not been discovered.
- From the 80s, researchers found fructose, one of the two main carbohydrates in refined sugar, is primarily metabolized by the liver; while glucose (in starchy food like bread and potatoes) is metabolized by all cells. Consuming excessive fructose puts extra strain on the liver, which then converts fructose to fat. This causes insulin resistance, a major risk factor for fatal diseases.
- One of the problems with the anti-sugar message is how depressing it is.
 The substance is so much part of our culture, that to be told buying your child an ice cream may be tantamount to poisoning him, is most unwell come.

Pop-ular snack explosion

- In the UK, popcorn consumption has puffed up quite substantially in the past few years. According to Mintel, market analysts, Brits bought 53 million pounds of popcorn in 2012. That's a pop in the microwave compaired to the 1,3 billion pounds they spent on crisps, or even the 345 million pounds of nuts they consumed. It represents at least a 10% leap or 20%, according to other analysts in just one year. Consumption is predicted to be much higher in years to come. 

TEXT A: COMPREHENSION Adaptation

- 1. Steve McQueen had seen more than 1000 actors for the role of the long-suffering Patsey in 12 Years a Slave. No one quite had the "majestic grace" he thought the part required. By the time he watched the tape sent in by an unknown Kenyan actress, Lupita Nyong'o, he'd started to question his own judgment "I just rubbed my eyes in disbelief and needed someone else to confirm what I was seeing". McQueen showed the audition to his 14-year-old daughter. Her response: "Wow. Who is she?" It took Nyong'o nine months to morph into a Bona Fide Star. The 30 year old sensation was this year's stand-out fresh face, floating gracefully down a succession of red carpets in a series of bold-coloured, eye-catching, sophisticated gowns.
- 2. The second of six children, Nyong'o was born in Mexico, where her father, who had been fighting for democracy against Kenya's then autocratic regime, was teaching political science at the Colegio de Mexico and hiding out after his brother had disappeared under unusual circumstances. When she was less than a year old, her parents moved back to Kenya. Her father is now a senator and her mother is the managing director of the Africa Cancer Foundation. She describes her childhood as "middle class, suburban", but adds, "It felt very normal to me, but 'normal' to me might be very different from 'normal' to you. I don't know what normal is." She attended an all-girls school, playing many sports poorly.
- 3. Her first months in the US were a shock. "I thrive on structure", she says. It was very hard to adjust to an individualistic and very liberal system. After my upbringing, I would iron 20 my clothes every night. I would plan what I wore the night before, and then I would iron it. That's just the way my mom raised us. Then I got to Hampshire, where clothing is something optional and all this kind of thing. I was mortified". She raises a perfectly arched brow and cuts into her sandwich with a knife and fork.
- 4. She also had her first run-in with the paparazzi. "I did not expect it. I went into flight 25 mode." Nor did she imagine she'd practically become a national hero in Kenya, where one Nairobi church reportedly held a thanksgiving Mass in her honour and the president sent out a tweet to congratulate her. "There are so many highlights that are no longer highlights," she says evenly. "I'm living a very swollen life." Fresh though her fame may be, she knows enough to be deliberate about it. Even with harmless details, she treads carefully. She doesn't want to talk about her morning routine, or her father's politics, or her meetings with her stylists.

- 5. Since the frenzy of awards season, Nyong'o says, "I've been in a bubble. I haven't been out much. I haven't got used to being recognized". Now she's learning. She's timidly approached by a pretty young woman with long dreadlocks. "Hello", the woman says 35 in hushed tones, "Are you Lupita?"

TEXT C: BIRD WATCHING

All of us have some knowledge of birds. We recognize Indian Mynas and are familiar with pigeons. The easiest way to start bird-watching is to carry a pocket notebook and, whilst in one's own garden, take quality time to look around. Look at the unfamiliar bird and roughly draw the shape of the head, body, tail and legs. Also record whether the bird is bigger or smaller than a Budgie. Next note any distinctive features on the body, such as different colours, flecks or any clear markings.

Birds in flight are notoriously difficult to identify. A pair of 8x4 binoculars is essential to have. Owning a birding telescope will make life much easier when sitting at a fixed position, such as sitting in a bird hide. Raptors, storks, migrating birds and the swallow family are regularly mis-identified. Similarly so the brown field birds, where distinguishing calls are the best way to positive identification.

Armed with this information, go to your field guide and go through each page looking specifically for something similar. Long thin beaks generally belong to nectar-eating birds like sunbirds. By eliminating what it is not, such as a sea bird, raptor or a ground bird, the choices are dramatically reduced. Elimination can also be done based on the bird's location and the time of year.

Finally join a birding group. Hopefully you can persuade a member with more experience to visit and take a look at the birds in your garden – walking and talking with a knowledgeable person reduces the arguments and frustrations.



His efforts have turned Braamfontein from a crumbling inner-city no-go zone into a chic urban hub, made up of boutiques and galleries in Juta Street and De Beer Street, apartment blocks and landmarks like The Beach, the Alexander Theatre and bustling Neighbourgoods Market.
- 2. Born and raised in Johannesburg, Adam took a gap year after completing his LLB at Wits and backpacked around the world. On his return he completed his articles at a law firm. He spent his lunch breaks speaking to property owners in the area and testing his recently-acquired commercial law knowledge. One of these conversations led to the purchase of his first building, a seven-storey apartment block that now houses his spectacular penthouse apartment.
- 3. "I got help raising capital and then threw a number of parties advertising these one-off 300-square-metre apartments. There was huge interest, which was ironic at the time everyone was saying 'nobody wants to be near a bridge or a railway station' and I disagreed. The apartments have amazing views." At the tender age of 25 Adam began his painstaking journey to rejuvenate this corner of the city. A key clause in the sale agreements was that the six owners of the apartments had to be owner-occupiers, so they'd have a vested interest in the development of the area.
- 4. "I wasn't born patient and that hasn't changed, but I now appreciate that it takes a long time to transform a city. In ten years we've never spent a single dime on promoting this area. Interest has grown by word of mouth. Most of my tenants are in their 20s and 30s and in the future, when they're established in their careers, they'll want to get involved in the area on a much bigger scale." From his multi- level penthouse the view is breathtaking. "My team says I celebrate when all the lights work," he says, only half joking. In the middle of a December thunderstorm he points towards the Queen Victoria Bridge and says that of the hundred or so lights on the bridge, only six are working. He spends a lot of time and energy communicating to the city about their failures.
- 5. Adam admits that the rooftop beach, The Beach on 68 Juta Street, was a spontaneous venture. He had in the past toyed with the idea of building a 'mega Sol Kezner beach' in the heart of the city. He was spurred into action after a visit to an under-

whelming rooftop bar in London. "When I saw it I thought 'This is amateur hour'. I'll show you how it's done. I thought it was just a case of getting sand and dumping it on a rooftop. My engineer soon appraised me of the complications. Before getting the 35 sand we first had to build a filter to put underneath it." After a six-tier filter system was constructed on the rooftop, 40 tons of three different grains of sand were brought in and Adam had vintage beach umbrellas and deck chairs ordered from Durban and Cape Town. "Now that we have our liquor licence and have events every Saturday, it's really taking shape as I imagined."

6. In January Adam opened Anti-Establishment, a bar on the ground floor of the Neighbourgoods Market. The idea is to give boutique liquor manufacturers exposure. His long-term goal for Braamfontein is to make it an aspirational residential area for young, upwardly-mobile professionals, which is why his next big project is an apartment block on De Beer Street. He has many more ideas in the pipeline for his beloved Braamfontein!

Money-savvy teens are more likely to turn into financially smart adults. Expose them to the benefits of saving early on so they get to see how rewarding it can be. 

- 4.5 B onomatopoeia (1)
- 4.6 She is buried underneath leaves by her own action. (Accept valid answer) (2)
- Open-ended. **Humour:** Granny is irritated by the noise; instead of hitting the mielies on the woman's head, she is hit by a heap of leaves.

Prejudice: Biased judgment, because the wealthy, white granny doesn't know the culture of the black woman, she is irritated by the hawker/seller.

Racism: The advantaged, white woman is biased, she believes that Whites are better than disadvantaged Blacks. (Apartheid) Accept good argument.

PAPER 3 WRITING

SECTION: A

QUESTION: 1

There are 8 topics including 2 - 3 visual stimuli. Choose only ONE topic.

Words: 250 – 300

No one will prescribe what type of essay a candidate should write on a topic. Make sure that you understand each word in the topic. For example (e.g.) an 'Adventure' is not going to the Mall to eat; do some shopping and meet a friend. There must be risk or danger involved, like a shoot-out.

Planning

Quickly trace your hand on the paper. Write a main idea in each finger. Now you have five paragraphs. If you're not able to, choose another topic. This method saves a lot of time and prevents false starts.

Drafting

Pay special attention to the introduction and conclusion. An essay is like a snake: the introduction is the sting to catch the reader's attention, and 3-5 paragraphs the body. The conclusion should be a twist in the tail – it should surprise or leave the marker in awe. Don't summarize the essay in the final paragraph, boring ...

Editing

- 1. Count your words, but don't write a number above each word. Substitute words e.g. 'nice' (which has lost its meaning) for more descriptive words.
- 2. Check whether you have used figures of speech, but not more than three times. An essay is like a fruit cake. Not enough fruit (f.o.s), and the cake is bland; too much fruit and the cake falls apart.
- 3. Cohesion and coherence: This means your sentences/paragraphs/narratives/arguments should be easy to follow, not rambling or inconsequent. Cohesion means 'sticking together', your paragraphs should not be loose-standing entities. Although you must skip a line between paragraphs, there should be words to link them e.g. 'firstly', 'however', 'the next day, etc. Don't join sentences with: and then, and then, and then!
- 4. Check punctuation, especially question marks and the apostrophe e.g. don't.

Now we are ready to write the final essay. (Don't write 'final draft', it is an oxymoron)

1. Narrative essay

This is usually the most popular choice, there are, however, pitfalls you must avoid.

- 1.1 Don't switch tenses. You are telling a story that happened a day/year ago, therefore you use PAST TENSE.
- 1.2 Avoid using Reported Speech if you are not sure how to. A common error is:

Direct Speech: John said, "Peter shot my buffalo"

Reported Speech: John said that Peter **shot** his buffalo. *This is wrong.*Reported Speech: John said that Peter **had shot** his buffalo. *This is correct.*

- 1.3 Avoid using conditional sentences: I wish, if, as if, suppose, it is time, if you are not sure how to. A common error is:
 - If I were you, I would go home. This sentence is wrong in a Past Tense essay. If I had been you, I would have gone home. This sentence is correct in P.T. essay.
- 1.4 If you know how, feel free to use Present Tense in the introduction or conclusion e.g.:
- Par.1 I'm sitting on a bench in the park. A boy kicks a ball and his dog fetches it. Suddenly tears run down my face and I remember ...
- Rest It was the year 1964 and I only knew happiness. Then catastrophe struck! Past T

Or

- Par.5 I lay on the pavement in a pool of my own blood. He then stole my car and drove off into the dark of night.
- Last P Even today I can't find it in my heart to hate you. My son, how I miss you today on your birthday ...
- 1.5 This can be a Subjective (personal pronouns: I, my, we) or Objective (from a third person perspective: he, his, they) essay. It's preferable to write about your own experiences. When your narrative/story is personal, you can vividly describe your five senses: see, hear, feel, smell and taste; even the sixth sense to create a spooky atmosphere!



E.g. There was an eerie silence. Suddenly I heard the muted sound of a twig breaking.

I became aware of the acrid taste of fear clinging to my palate...

1.6 Don't write what a five-year-old can tell his mother – you are in Gr. 12

2 Descriptive essay

If you are a keen observer and love detail, this should be your choice:

- 2.1 Usually Present Tense. Remember Figures of speech, adjectives and adverbs.
- 2.2 It is very effective if you use long sentences and words, with open vowels and more than one syllable, when you describe slow movement e.g.:

The wide river meanders slowly between the weeping willows.

When you describe fast movement use short sentences and one-syllabic words e.g.:

The grey finch hops from branch to branch.

- 2.3 The most common error here is sentence structure. Many learners don't know the difference between a sentence, clause and phrase.
 - A Watching the slow, rising sun behind the blue shed with my vicious dog very early every morning.

This is not a sentence, it's a phrase. It needs a (finite) verb e.g.: I <u>love</u> watching the slow, rising ...

B When she sings loudly in the steaming shower before going to bed.

This is not a sentence, it's a (subordinate) clause. It needs a main clause e.g.:

It irritates me when she sings ...

C She sings.

This is a sentence, but not a descriptive one. It needs an adjective/adverb/figures of speech.

You may write a phrase (A) or a clause (B) for stylistic effect, but not more than once.

3 **Argumentative essay**

- 3.1 Usually Present Tense. You should know some facts, or have a very strong opinion about the topic. You should be able to elaborate/prove your point, or be very passionate about it, otherwise this type of essay tends to become repetitive.
- 3.2 Use persuasive words like 'definitely', 'therefore' and phrases like 'without a doubt' also a rhetorical question if applicable.
- 3.3 Arguments must be reasonable/logical; also show cause/effect.
- 3.4 You must be able to convince the reader/marker of your viewpoint.
- 3.5 Register always respectful.

4 Reflective essay

- 4.1 This is similar to a descriptive essay, only more personal and emotional.
- 4.2 You have to reflect on a dream or an aspiration.
- 4.3 Avoid using conditional words especially 'I wish', 'If only I could', 'Suppose'
- 4.4 This type of essay can easily become mere ramblings and musings.

5 Discursive essay

Few learners choose this essay. It is similar to the argumentative, except that there are now different viewpoints: for and against plus supporting evidence.

- 5.1 Present Tense. After posing different viewpoints and weighing supporting evidence, a conclusion is reached.
- 5.2 Unlike the argumentative essay, you don't have to convince the reader/marker of any one viewpoint.
- 5.3 The conclusion consists of a summary and recommendations.

Paper 3 can make or break you. Please, be creative. Markers love humorous essays.

Errors:

I thought by myself ... Can you think by someone else? Tautology! I thought...

... to the fullest. There is no such word. Full, then overflowing.

Say-said; pay-paid; lay - laid, but word with 2 consonants: play - played; sway - swayed

SECTION B: LONGER TRANSACTIONAL TEXT

There are too many types of texts (refer to CAPS: page 85) and various formats of transactional texts that I will only touch briefly on this section and Section C.

- 1. Most formal transactional texts are legal documents. They must have a date and a name, e.g. if you vilified/defamed the Minister of Justice in a newspaper article he would know who to sue.
- 2. Register is very important. You would never use the same language in the Principal's office that you would use with your friends on the soccer/rugby field. Always show respect.
- 3. Cut to the chase: no good mornings, how are you blah, blah, Short introduction/salutation.
- 4. Remember the 4 W's: Where, When, What, Why.

5. Dialogue

The Gr 12 Amateur Drama Club is waiting on stage to start rehearsing their new play. As usual the leading man is late.

John (angrily): Why are you late again, we have already started to...

Peter (laughingly): Stop behaving like a General in the army.

John: How dare you interrupt me!

Peter: Chill man, you should know by now that I would never be late on purpose.

John: We don't have time now to listen to your lame excuse.

Please, get on stage.

Peter: All right, Johnny Boy, I'm as ready as a rod. Am I forgiven?

John: Yes, Peter Pan, if you grow up and act more maturely.

You realise that if we want an A++ at the Eisteddfod we will have to put

shoulder to the wheel.

Peter: You can depend on me. Come on Best Buddy, high five!

(They briefly touch hands)

Chorus: Hear! Hear!
